

Questions & Answers

: What are pixels and dots?

: This is an area of great confusion. The word pixel (picture element) is used to mean at least two different things — the photosites on the sensor and the smallest element of the picture on the monitor screen. A photo-site on the sensor is occupied, though not exclusively, by a light sensitive photodiode.

Popular Photography magazine erroneously calls a photosite a dot. The photodiodes are color blind. They measure only the intensity of light, not its color. Therefore, a red, green, or blue filter is fitted above a photodiode. The photosites of different color are not situated as a triad but arranged by a Bayer mosaic. This means that two photosites of the same color are not next to each other, and the sensor has twice as many green photosites as either red or blue. This array emphasizes green as the center component of the spectrum and compensates for the sensitivity of the human vision. Although the number of red, green and blue photosites is not equal, three photosites are called a pixel. This is unfortunate, but cannot be changed anymore. Hence a 10 MP sensor has 30 million photosites.

The resolution of the monitor is measured

in ppi (pixels per inch). The pixel here means the smallest picture element on the monitor screen. The monitor uses the Red, Green, Blue color model.

The resolution of the printer is measured in dpi (dots per inch). A resolution of 300 dpi is considered normal, although 240 dpi may be adequate for prints not viewed closely. A printer uses the CMYK color mode: cyan, magenta, yellow, and black. However, the file sent to the printer should be in the RGB color space because the printer is programmed to accept RGB files. A jet of the inkjet printer squirts 0-8 tiny droplets of one ink to make a dot, which is the smallest element of the printed picture.

: I own a Nikon D5000 and a Nikkor 55-200 f4-5.6 AF-S DX lens and need a little more length. Sigma makes two lenses that are in my budget, a 120-400mm f4.5-5.6 and 150-500mm f5-6.3. Does one offer an advantage over the other, realizing the obvious 100mm difference? I have heard that Sigma has problems with auto-focus motors in the telephoto lenses. Are the Sigma lenses durable?

: Two tele lenses are not compared by the difference in the focal lengths, but by the ratio of the focal lengths. Although the 500mm focal length lens is 100mm longer, the 150-500mm lens magnifies only 1.25 times more than the 120-400mm lens. More importantly, the Sigma 120-400mm lens is an f/4.5-to 5.6, whereas the 150-500mm lens drops from f/5 to f/6.3 at the long end and autofocus becomes sluggish.

The longer zoom is much heavier, 4.8 lb (2.18 kg) vs. 3.8 lb (1.75 kg), and has a larger filter (86mm vs.77mm).

Both Sigma lenses have made good pictures, printed in magazines.

I am not a bird photographer and for me the Nikon 70-300mm 4.5-5.6 VR lens is just fine.

The weight is 1.6 lb (0.745 kg), filter size 67mm (I use a step-up ring to77mm). The price is about half of the Sigma 120-400mm lens which can magnify only 1.33 times more. This is not a significant difference to me, but if this is important for you, be prepared to carry a lens twice as heavy.

The picture below of the fire boat was taken with my Nikon 70-300mm VR lens.



The autofocus motor in Sigma, Tamron, and even in a pro quality f/2.8 Nikon lens may malfunction. The durability depends on how the lens is used. Sigma lenses are not sealed against dust and moisture as well as the Nikon pro lenses. However, I have used Sigma telezoom lenses for years without trouble, and two lenses that I use frequently are Sigmas. The "pro" caliber Sigma lenses are quite solid, but not cheap.

: I read in Digital Photo Pro that the noise of a camera can be lower at a higher ISO value. Is this true?

: The ISO values indicate how much the signal from the sensor is amplified. The electronic noise is amplified as well, proportionally to ISO. However, the amount of noise observed in a digital image depends how the

signal, generated by the sensor, is processed and how the noise is measured. Every signal of a photosite is processed by the analog-to-digital converter and by the array processor. At a certain ISO value, the camera processor reduces noise. Even a RAW file is not entirely untouched by the camera because it might not avoid the noise reduction. Before testing, the noise reduction must be turned off to have a level field for comparing cameras and the effect of ISO values.

The published noise data is sometimes contradictory because the tests differ. The test data published by *Popular Photography* for recent cameras cannot be compared with the noise data for older cameras because the test method has been changed. However, test data can be used to determine how noise depends on ISO.

When I plotted the *Popular Photography* noise numbers against the ISO values, all points fell on a straight line. This means that noise increases linearly with ISO values, as expected. Consequently, it is incorrect to say that the camera becomes noisy at ISO 800, for example. The correct statement is that the noise level of the camera is acceptable below ISO 800.

Because of the uncertainties of the test procedures, I am designing my own noise test method. I was concerned with the noise of Nikon D 7000 because of the high megapixel count, but according to my tests, noise is not a problem.

Calendar Photographs Requested

PNC prefers that each photograph be submitted as hard copy **accompanied by** a digital version of the image on a CD. The digital version should be in TIFF format at a 3:2 aspect ratio (example 12" X 8") with a minimum resolution of 300 ppi. However, a JPG file with minimum compression is acceptable on disk, provided it is 300 ppi at 12" X 8." The hard copy version may be on a smaller paper size as long as the 3:2 aspect ratio is maintained.

Good quality slides are acceptable — without the accompanying electronic version on CD. Slides should be submitted in plastic sheets.

Each photo must be labeled with the maker's name, the location shown in the image, and a filename that corresponds to the filename on the accompanying CD. Any number of images may be submitted. Photos that were previously entered, but not selected, can be resubmitted.

Images will be returned to the maker in late December. Every member that submits images will be given a copy of the calendar. Submissions should be made to Marvin Gerstein at a DPS event, or mailed/delivered to his home. Please contact Marvin at MarvTU@aol.com or 302.475.5939. if you have questions or to arrange a delivery.

The DPS has a contract with the PNC Bank of Delaware to provide images for the calendar that the bank presents to their business customers. PNC pays the photographer \$135 for each image selected, plus \$200 for the image selected for the calendar cover. All DPS members are welcome to submit photos.

Each July, DPS submits images for PNC's selection. This year's deadline for submission is July 31, 2011.

Photographs taken from all areas of Delaware, from all three counties, during all seasons of the year, and in all types of weather are wanted for the calendar. Images must be in a horizontal (landscape) format, and must be in color. Any subject is acceptable, but attractive scenes are typically selected. Photos of a specific religious group should not be submitted. If recognizable persons appear in a submitted photo, a photo release must be included with your submission.

This overhaul is past due, as there are many outdated titles and shifted responsibilities. The proposed changes are needed to bring the Bylaws upto-date in keeping with actual practice. The most important change is the creation of a new elected officer, that of Information Technology (IT) Director. This position is designed to supervise the many sophisticated computerized functions throughout

our Society and to provide highly experienced, professional guidance. The committee members feel that this will provide better coordination of activities in our ever increasing computerization.

Following the vote of approval on June 6, there will be an extraordinary election to fill the newly created IT Director position. The nominating committee recommends that this position be filled by John Davis. He is highly qualified with many years of experience in this field at DuPont and has graciously offered to lend his considerable expertise by serving the DPS in this capacity.
